

15:4-21	<ul> <li>Tough Problems Call for Tough Leaders</li> <li>vv4-6. Though the church "received" Paul's entourage with open arms, it was the Apostles and Elders who came together to "look into the matter"</li> <li>This effort was going to need the most spiritually mature among them to resolve this issue quickly, correctly, decisively, and gently</li> <li>An ad-hoc church committee composed of nice people of varying levels of spiritual maturity was not going to get this job done the right way or in a timely manner, even with Robert's Rules of Order</li> <li>Even the elders, themselves, were going to come at this from different sides – BUT they had to be mature enough to come at this in the right Spirit, in gentleness, and for God's ultimate glory</li> <li>v7. "After there had been much debate" Presumably, everyone had their say and no one was rudely interrupted without an apology.</li> <li>They looked at this issue from every angle, for wisdom often has 2 sides</li></ul>
15:22-30	Problem Solved – But Can We Get a Consensus?  Yes, the Elders concluded the matter, and it was not based on culture but on God's word  Now, could they get church acceptance or buy-in?  Notice what they did and how they did it:  Decisive – All Elders were in agreement  Definitive – There was no ambiguity what to do  Concrete – They put it in writing for the record  Confirmation – They sent "leading" men with Paul to confirm and substantiate the resolution
15:31	The Result was Positive  ■ Everyone was encouraged!WHY?  □ Problems can be fixed   □ Unity is possible  □ Good mature spiritual leaders are available
