**INTRODUCTION**

- **Historical Note.** Roman Emperor Claudius (aka, Tiberius Claudius Caesar Augustus Germanicus) reigned from 41-54 AD. Claudius expelled Jews from Rome in 49 AD for creating disturbances because of Christ (see Acts 18:2). After Claudius' death, Jews began to return to Rome under the new Caesar, Nero, who was Claudius' grand-nephew and adopted son. Nero reigned from 54-68 AD. Paul is heading for Rome ~60 AD, and would spend 2 years there.
- In this last chapter of Acts, we see Paul healing everyone on the island of Malta of any & every ailment before arriving in Rome. Wow! Is this a one-of-a-kind event or a repeatable event?

Acts 28:1-10	<p><b>Providence or Accident or Coincidence?</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• v1. Was the shipwreck on the island of Malta a providential work of God or a freak accident?</li> <li>• v3. Was the snake an accident or godly providence?</li> <li>• v6. Why would the islanders say Paul was a god? Would this information be critical in how Paul reached out to them with the Gospel or trivial?                     <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>♦ How have you altered your witnessing style based on what you know about your audience?</li> </ul> </li> <li>• v8. IOW, it describes what happened in the Early Church, &amp; not prescribes what should happen in churches today. Apostles &amp; supernatural miracles were for then, but not for now.</li> </ul>

28:11-16	<p><b>Paul Arrives in Rome</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• vv14-15. Paul took courage when fellow believers sought him out. Why is friendship so critical?  <b>Consider this.</b> God wants to call each of us “friends” which means we need to show ourselves friendly, loyal, accessible, trustworthy                     <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>♦ Have we spent time with God this week?</li> <li>♦ Have we been friendly toward our loved ones, family, friends, and strangers?</li> <li>♦ Have we sacrificed anything to help a friend?</li> <li>♦ Have we sought out and shown friendliness to those in ministry? How can we do so?</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
28:17-31	<p><b>Fake News and Strong Biases Doomed Some</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• v22. Fake News – This sect (cult) is spoken against everywhere – But WHY, if its beliefs saves lives?</li> <li>• v23. From morning until evening Paul took the time to expound, explain, persuade, &amp; solemnly testify about God's Kingdom. What can one talk about for 16+ hours? Heaven? Creation? Resurrections? Jesus being 100% God and 100% Man? The Holy Spirit? Probably all that and many more good topics!</li> <li>• v24. And some believed. How can we be prepared to logically expound the Gospel to those who ask for the reason of hope that is in us? ..... 1Peter 3:15</li> <li>• vv33-31. Paul was in Rome 2 years preaching the Kingdom of God with unhindered freedom                     <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>♦ God showed favor toward Paul. He literally “prepared a banquet table in the presence of [Paul's] enemies” (Ps 23:5). Can He do the same for us? No reason why not if it brings Him glory!</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

**THE REST OF THE STORY**

- Paul was eventually released after 2 years in Rome. Tradition says Paul made it to Spain, but eventually ended up back in Rome.
- The New Testament does not say when or how Paul died, but some early church fathers state he was beheaded by Nero. The date of Paul's death is believed to have occurred after the Great Fire of Rome in July 64 AD but before the last year of Nero's reign in 68 AD

**NEXT WEEK: 1Cor 1-3.** Paul spent 18 months in Corinth, and he writes them a letter some time later to try to fix some divisions, false teachings, immoral issues, and misuse of spiritual gifts. Even the best of teachers can have some wayward students.
