INTRODUCTION

- The 2nd round of dialogues begins between the 4 men with ever increasing belittlement from Job's 3 friends. Yet Job defends his righteousness and calls on God to hear him out
- All the speakers, Job, Eliphaz, Bildad, and Zophar are still caught up
 with the concept that God only allows the wicked to go through
 horrendous turmoil and reserves blessings just for the righteous
- This concept originated from the dawn of time with Adam and the Garden of Eden all the way through the Noahic flood
- In fact, if Job and his friends truly lived during or just before Abraham's lifetime, they would have been quite familiar with the flood stories, possibly 1st hand, from Noah himself. If they lived after Abraham's time, then they still would have had possible 1st hand recollection from Noah's son, Shem, who helped build the boat. (see timeline chart below of the post-flood patriarchs)



Job 15	 Eliphaz Speaks – and Condemns Job's Wickedness v2. Eliphaz basically calls Job a 'wind bag' v10. Eliphaz alludes to a common knowledge base about God since "Both the gray-haired and the aged are among us, older than your father" – A possible allusion to Noah and Shem or their contemporaries 			
Job 16-17	 Job Speaks – "Sorry comforters are you all"16:2 16:12-13. Job states that God is using him as a target to shoot at without mercy. The Psalmist said something similar in Psalms 44:22 "we are killed all day long as sheep to be slaughtered" 17:9. Yet, Job acknowledged that one day the righteous will "grow stronger and stronger" 			
Job 18	Bildad Speaks – Job's Wickedness is Obvious to All v5. "the light (prosperity) of the wicked goes out" v11. "and his skin is devoured by disease" v19and "he has no offspring or survivor"			
Job 19	Job Speaks – and Accuses God of Wronging Him v6. "I know that God has wronged me" v7. "I cry out for help, but there is no justice" v11. "God considers me as His enemy" v13-14. My family, friends, & staff see me as a stranger v17. Even my wife finds me offensive v18. Even young children (~grandkids) despise me v20. "I have escaped only by the skin of my teeth" IOW, he is barely hanging onto life vv25-26. YET – Job knows his Redeemer lives, and he will one day see God			
God has Broad Shoulders	God Allows Job (and Us) to Vent Our Frustrations • We don't have perfect faith, we don't see the invisible, and we are blind to the future, so venting happens			

Passage	Comments
Job 20	Zophar Speaks – and Concludes Job must be Wicked v4. Zophar states that the "triumphing of the wicked" is short-lived v18. And the wicked cannot enjoy the riches he makes since he has oppressed and forsaken the poor v28. So, Zophar concludes Job is wicked since his possessions have left him
Job was the start of new Lessons to be Learned	God's Progressive Revelations Eventually Reveal: Ecc 7:15and there is a wicked man who prolongs his life in his wickedness Ecc 8:14there are righteous men who get what the wicked deserve, and wicked men who get what the righteous deserve. Ps 94:3. How long, O LORD, shall the wicked triumph?
Job 21	Job Speaks – and Realizes the State of the Wicked • vv7-15. If God is a loving God "Why do the wicked still live and continue to grow more powerful?" • They have big houses and many possessions • They party hardy and their prosperity grows • v30. "For the wicked are RESERVED for the day of calamity and are led forth at the day of fury" − This seems to be a weak translation by the NASB, KJ, and NKJ versions • The NIV, HCSB, ESV and NRSV render a different view: "Evil people are SPARED in times of calamity and are allowed to escape disaster" • This seems to fit the context better

CONCLUSION/APPLICATIONS

- We get a better sense of Job's perspective of being relentlessly pummeled both by God and by his remaining friends
- The Deuteronomic principle of the blessings of the righteous and the cursings of the wicked has its place, but in Job's situation it was greatly misapplied

NEXT WEEK: Job 22-28. The 3rd and final round of tit-for-tat bantering concludes with no conclusion. Job's friends continue to condemn him for unknown sins and Job continues to protest his innocence.
